Baton Rouge Reunion

Our next reunion is going to be in Baton Rouge, LA., as decided by a vote of our members at our last reunion. The dates of the reunion are; Friday April 29, Saturday April 30 thru Sunday May 1. As always the discounted reunion room rate is available 3 days prior and after the actual event.

We will stay at the Radisson Baton Rouge Hotel. The hotel gets good reviews online at TripAdvisor.com.

The room rate is \$95.99 a night plus tax. Included in the room price is a breakfast daily for two. You must call and make your own reservation by calling 225-236-4000. The reservation cutoff date is March 29, 2016.

We have contracted for a day long motor coach tour on the Saturday of the reunion. Our first destination will be the Cajun Pride Swamp Tour. The local Visitor's Bureau said that the tour is a "must" for those visiting the Baton Rouge area. It also gets rave reviews on TripAdvisor. (CajunPrideTours.com)

After the swamp tour we stop at Ralph and Kacoo's Restaurant for lunch which is included in the price of the tour. Quite a large selection of entrees are offered and you can choose at the time of the meal.

After lunch we are off to the USS Kidd (DD-661) (Fletcher class) Veterans Memorial and museum. The USS Kidd is located on the Mississippi River. (It is also right next to the Belle of Baton Rouge Casino) The price of the complete tour, with lunch, will be \$75 a person.

On the Sunday of the reunion we will have our General Meeting, Memorial Service and later our banquet at the Radisson Baton Rouge Hotel. At the banquet we will be entertained by a local Cajun dance troupe, Les Danseurs de Baton Rouge, they come highly recommended and promise to put on a fantastic show.


The house that Jack (and son) built






Re-enactor guarding the Gettysburg battlefield

Memories from Shipmate Jack Henderson to Joe Napoli:

This article contains memories as related to me in several phone conversations. When Jack was 17 he joined the Navy and served a little over 4 years. From 1948 to 1949 he was a Radioman aboard the USS Compton. All of the stories he spoke of were interesting and worthy of sharing with our shipmates. What interested me most, however, was the activities of the Compton in 1948 off the coast of Haifa, Palestine, which if my geography is correct, is now in Israel. I had never heard anything about the Compton during that period of time.

Jack recalls the Compton being sent to the area to protect Jewish settlers going to Palestine - - after being displaced during WW2. It was part of a United Nations operation. He spoke of people heading towards land in all types boats. A French ship accompanied the Compton and they both anchored very close to land. Jack could see the early fighters of the now Israeli army, both men and women, in camp close to shore. Gunfire could also be heard from small arms. He was sure that the Compton flew a blue and white United Nations flag at the fantail while at anchor.

A radio message was received from the French ship which stated that they were under threat of attack by 30 Egyptian bombers. Jack delivered the message to the captain and the captain did not believe the message saying that the Egyptians did not have 30 bombers. He wanted confirmation of the message and the French ship lowered the number of bombers to 13. Jack said that he later saw 3 planes pass close by but could not identify them. Gunfire soon followed but did not know if that involved the planes.

I don't think that Jack was the model seaman while aboard the Compton. Jack said that he did not drink coffee, and does not to this day. While in the radio shack the guys took turn making coffee but Jack contended that he did not have to make coffee because he did not drink it. Evidently this did not go over too well and he was brought up on charges after refusing an order to make coffee. At Captain's Mast he was fined \$25 and had to do extra work starting at 1600 hours, the end of the normal work day, for a period of time. He said he chipped a lot of paint. Even after that he never made coffee.

Jack spoke of one weekend, while in Newport, that he went home. It was not a weekend that he had liberty but that did not alter his plans. When he returned to the ship he was shocked that no one made a big deal of the incident. The XO at the time knew of Jack and, for some reason, treated him like his son. When the next weekend came around the XO just told Jack that he was restricted and could not go home. Jack accepted that.


Very interesting and scary story about two of our active Compton Association members Grant Mauri and Frank Caccioppoli

In December 16 1960, (Google) there was a collision of two planes over Staten Island, New York with debris also falling into Prospect Park.

Frank and I lived across from each other and went to Boot Camp together. After camp, we were scheduled to board that TWA flight home. We were the last two people in line and were told they could not accept any more passengers on that flight as it was booked full.

There was availability on a Military Air Transport (MAT) and we had our ride home. Keeping it scary, this plane lost a engine, on my side, and we had to make an emergency landing in New Jersey.

We finally made it home at 2:00 AM and walked in the house and both families were there crying over the two of us—who were scheduled to be on that ill-fated plane.


